SUGGESTED USES FOR THIS VIDEO

* Use this film as part of a series on the creed, an introduction to a night exploring the significance of Jesus' humanity, or as part of confirmation preparation.

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

- 1. Answer the film's questions:
 - a. What do you like about where you live?
 - b. If you could have chosen to be born anywhere, at any time, to any family, what would you choose?
 - c. If you could choose any way to die, what would you choose?
- 2. Why do you think it was important that Jesus was born in Bethlehem? In a manger?
- 3. Why do you think it was important that Jesus was born into the family he had?
- 4. How do we know that Jesus wasn't forced into dying on the cross?
- 5. Why is it important that Jesus CHOSE to die? (as opposed to being forced)
- 6. Why did Jesus choose to become "one of us"? Couldn't he have saved us without taking on our humanity?
- 7. Are you more comfortable with one aspect of Jesus' nature than the other? If so, which one and why?
- 8. How can you more comfortably embrace the other side of Jesus' nature?
- 9. Is it possible to explain to someone what we mean when we say that Jesus was fully God and fully man? Is it necessary to be able to explain that?
